EXECUTIVE SUMMARY



The 2025-2030 Tourism Strategy will provide the Town of Okotoks with a clear, actionable framework to manage tourism in a way that supports local businesses, preserves the community's small-town charm, and reflects what residents value most.

Okotoks already attracts visitors drawn to its vibrant events, natural beauty, unique shops, and welcoming atmosphere. However, until now, there hasn't been a unified approach to guide tourism growth. This strategy offers a shared vision, ensuring that tourism develops in ways that benefit both visitors and residents alike.

Grounded in extensive community input, research, and the Town's unique strengths, the strategy is about more than simply welcoming more visitors. It's about using tourism to create local jobs, enhance public spaces, protect the environment, and celebrate what makes Okotoks truly special.

Pillar 1: Tourism Management & Collaboration

The Town will take the lead in tourism planning, working closely with residents, businesses, and community partners. A dedicated Tourism Advisory Group will help guide decisions, ensuring that tourism development is shaped by the community's voice.

Pillar 2: Destination Development

Improvements to signage, visitor information, and public spaces will make Okotoks even more accessible and inviting. These enhancements will not only enrich the visitor experience but also foster local pride and benefit residents.

Pillar 3: Product & Experience Development

The Town will champion events and activities that showcase Okotoks' unique identity and community spirit. These experiences will encourage visitors to stay longer, explore more, and return again and again.

Pillar 4: Marketing & Promotion

Okotoks will be promoted as a friendly, charming, and distinctive destination. Marketing efforts will highlight authentic local stories, businesses, and the qualities that set the community apart.

This strategy aligns with the Town's broader goals and vision for the future. Underpinning this strategy will be a detailed implementation plan that outlines next steps, clarifies responsibilities, and establishes clear measures of success.

Why Tourism? Why Now?

Telling the Okotoks Story Through a New Lens

Tourism in Okotoks is already happening. Every week, our community welcomes regional day-trippers, families visiting loved ones, weekend marketgoers, sports teams, and boutique shoppers. They're drawn here by the same things our residents value: a walkable downtown, vibrant local culture, family-friendly events, and access to nature.

What's been missing is a coordinated approach. Until now, tourism has grown organically, without a shared vision to guide its direction. Without a strategy, we risk missed opportunities, infrastructure strain, and growth that doesn't reflect community values.

Now is the time to act. Visitor demand is shifting away from mass tourism and toward authentic, small-town experiences rooted in local identity. Okotoks is naturally aligned with this trend. Our proximity to major markets, strong sense of place, and growing arts, culture, and recreation assets position us to welcome more visitors in a way that strengthens not replaces what makes our Town special.

At the same time, we acknowledge resident concerns around traffic volumes, perceived rapid community growth, and the potential impact of increased visitation. This strategy responds to those concerns by focusing on managed, sustainable tourism that enhances quality of life for residents while supporting economic growth. It sets the vision for how tourism will grow in Okotoks, outlining key actions and focus areas to guide future decisions, investments, and collaboration.

This Tourism Strategy will build directly on the Okotoks Economic Development Strategic Plan (2024-2029), which identifies tourism as a key sector for economic diversification. Aligned with that broader vision, this strategy ensures that tourism development supports local entrepreneurs, attracts new investment, and delivers long-term benefits for residents, businesses, and the broader community.

Tourism in Okotoks is growing. We're seeing more visitors, higher event attendance, and greater interest in local attractions. But without clear direction, this growth could cause problems and make it harder to reap the full benefits.

Residents, businesses, and regional partners have voiced strong support for thoughtful, values-driven tourism development. They want to see their voices reflected in how we grow.

Tourism is not separate from local life. It's an extension of it. Visitors are drawn to the same things residents value. When planned with intention, tourism becomes a tool to enhance those assets, reinvest in local amenities, and support community priorities.



Tourism & Community Priorities

Tourism in Okotoks is not a standalone service; it is an important component that supports several key Town goals across multiple strategy frameworks including:

- **Municipal Development Plan:** to support complete, walkable and sustainable communities
- **Economic Development Strategic Plan:** Tourism is one of the three key sectors in the Strategic Plan to help diversify the economy, support entrepreneurs and grow the visitor economy
- **Event Strategy:** to strengthen year-round programming and drive cultural vibrancy
- **Culture, Heritage & Arts Master Plan:** to highlight local assets and creative industries
- **Social Needs Assessment & Strategy:** to foster pride of place and inclusive experiences
- **Climate Action Plan:** to champion sustainable, low-impact travel and environmental stewardship



UNDERSTANDING THE CURRENT STATE OF TOURISM IN OKOTOKS



Methodology

This Tourism Strategy reflects a two-phase approach to tourism planning in Okotoks, grounded in community input and aligned with the Town's broader strategic priorities. An implementation plan will underpin this strategy in Phase 2, detailing actions, responsibilities, and measures of success.

Phase One

The State of Tourism in Okotoks involved the completion of the Current State of Tourism in Okotoks report in December 2024. This foundational report provided a baseline assessment of the local tourism landscape, including strengths, gaps, and emerging opportunities.

Key Takeaways

1. Tourism is already happening:

Many local businesses and events attract visitors, even if they don't identify as part of the tourism sector. This shows that tourism is active and growing, though not always formally recognized.

2. Okotoks has strong tourism foundations:

The Town's charm, vibrant arts and culture, community events, walkable downtown, and welcoming atmosphere create authentic experiences that make Okotoks appealing to visitors.

3. Efforts are fragmented and need strategic alignment:

While tourism activity exists, it is not coordinated. Businesses and organizers are often working independently without a shared direction or unified approach to grow tourism effectively.

4. Stakeholders want leadership, collaboration, and clear direction:

Businesses are eager to support tourism growth but are looking to the Town to lead with a clear strategy, consistent communication, and stronger opportunities for joint planning and promotion.

5. Stronger data and broader recognition is needed

Tourism is not always seen as a community priority, which limits investment and coordination. Businesses also identified a lack of reliable visitor data as a challenge, making it difficult to track trends, identify gaps, and make informed decisions.

Phase Two

The 2025-2030 Tourism Strategy builds on the insights and achievements of Phase One establishing a clear vision and direction for the next five years.

This phase defines a comprehensive strategy and outlines key actions to guide decision-making, align partners, and promote sustainable tourism growth. Upon adoption, this strategy will be underpinned by a detailed implementation plan that specifies how the strategy and key actions will be executed including timelines, responsible stakeholders, and refined success measures to support progress tracking and accountability.

While a detailed implementation plan will follow, this strategy was shaped by community input at every stage starting with early insights in Phase One and confirmed through validation in Phase Two. This approach ensures the path forward reflects local priorities and builds shared ownership of Okotoks' tourism future.



Community Engagement

The Town is committed to engaging with key impacted and interested parties when making decisions that have the potential to impact them. The engagement for this project was at the **CONSULT** level of the spectrum.

The graphic below shows how we reached out to the community during the tourism strategy process this past spring. Through social media, newsletters, local media, the Shape Our Town project page, and in-person outreach, we connected with thousands of residents to ensure their voices helped shape the future of tourism in Okotoks.

Visitor Snapshot

Understanding who visits is essential for shaping a tourism strategy that supports local businesses, enhances visitor experiences, and guides future planning. By identifying key patterns and behaviours, we can make informed decisions to strengthen our position as welcoming destination.

According to Travel Alberta's Foothills Tourism Development Zone Discovery Report (2023), regional tourism trends reveal the following:

- Most visitors come from nearby areas, especially major urban centres like Calgary.
- Half of all visitors return more than once a year, reflecting strong regional loyalty and sustained interest in the area.
- Visits typically span approximately 45 hours, suggesting an opportunity to encourage longer stays and increase local economic impact.

For the Town of Okotoks, these insights offer valuable direction for how we can better engage visitors, support the local economy, and position ourselves as a vibrant part of the regional tourism landscape.

Progress will be measured through clear indicators tied to each of the four strategic pillars. This will support evaluation, funding alignment, and transparent public reporting.

Underpinning this strategy is a strong commitment to data-driven decision making. As part of the subsequent implementation plan, we will evaluate ways to enhance tourism data collection and analysis, with a focus on understanding visitor patterns such as origins, timing, activities, spending, and impacts on local businesses.

This process will carefully consider factors such as ease of data collection, cost, and ongoing maintenance to identify the most feasible and effective approaches. This data will enable the Town to make more informed decisions, measure tourism's impact accurately, uncover new opportunities, and ensure that tourism in Okotoks can grow in a way that delivers lasting benefits creating a vibrant, welcoming destination that reflects the heart of the community.



Pillar 2: Destination Development

Destination development is about making Okotoks a place where visitors feel welcome and can easily find their way around.
